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## HISTORY: About the Burials of Brandon Sanatorium Patients on the Sioux Valley Dakota Nation Reserve

The Brandon Indian Sanatorium opened in 1947 and operated primarily as a tuberculosis (TB) hospital for Indigenous patients until 1961, when the last TB patients were transferred to the nearby Ninette Sanatorium. Thereafter the buildings housed the Assiniboine Rehabilitation Hospital until it relocated to new quarters in 1974. Indigenous patients with other ailments and some non-Indigenous patients were admitted to the hospital during its operation.

Patients at the Brandon Indian Sanatorium came from all over Manitoba, from Saskatchewan, north-western Ontario, and the North-West Territories. Inuit patients from different areas of the Arctic were sent to the Brandon Sanatorium, as were residential school students, including some from the nearby Brandon Indian Residential School (BIRS). Historical accounts from residential school survivors tell us that students who ran away from the BIRS were sent to the Sanatorium for punishment; healthy students sent to the Sanatorium sometimes ended up contracting tuberculosis or other illnesses during their stay.

Based on early findings, researchers believe that the federal government started sending deceased patients from the Brandon Sanatorium to Sioux Valley (SVDN) for burial in the Anglican cemetery on the reserve beginning in early 1950. Prior to 1950, patients whose remains were not sent to their home communities were buried in the Brandon Municipal Cemetery. Some patients who passed away after the Sioux Valley cemetery was no longer being used for patient burial appear to have been buried in the Brandon Municipal Cemetery, as well. The shift to burying patients at SVDN was a cost-saving effort on the part of the Department of Indian Affairs and was based on an agreement between the SVDN (Oak River) band council and the federal government. Canada paid for the burials of Indigenous patients at federal Indian hospitals and provincially funded TB sanatoriums when families could not be reached or were unable to cover the cost of burial. At the time, burial in the Brandon Municipal Cemetery cost \$250, while records show that \$45 was the total amount Canada paid for burials at SVDN. MITHP researchers believe Canada stopped sending patients to be buried at SVDN early in 1958, when records show that SVDN requested an end to the arrangement due to the heavy labour required to dig graves in frozen ground in the depths of prairie winters.

Collaborative research by SVDN and the MITHP has identified roughly 50 burials to date in the area set aside for Brandon patients in the cemetery at Sioux Valley. We believe that the graves were initially marked with wooden crosses that included an engraved metal plate with the name of the deceased. Over time and due to a prairie fire that swept through the section of the cemetery that contains the Brandon Sanatorium burials, some of these grave markers are no longer standing or the name plates are missing.



The names of former patients who have been identified so far are listed below. We cannot know for sure if this is a complete list. We will update the list on the MITHP website <u>https://indigenoustbhistory.ca</u> as our research progresses.
